

How to ride the Toei Bus and the Tokyo Sakura Tram (Toden Arakawa line)

It's much easier than you think. Just follow these three steps!

1 **Check the route number and destination**

Check the direction and the route indicator displayed on the front of the vehicle before you get on.

Enter through the front door and pay the fare 2

You get on at the front and pay either with cash or IC card. If you are travelling using a Toei One-day Pass, flash your ticket with the date clearly displayed.

Exit through the back door 3

The upcoming stop will be announced over the intercom and displayed on the screen. Press the buzzer located on window sills or rails to inform the driver that you'd like to get off. *Note that some of these rules vary in the Tama area



NR Saunter with the elders

Sugamo is known as 'Harajuku for grannies' and this lively shopping street is its answer to Takeshita-dori. In addition to visiting the namesake temple, you can tour many little shops and restaurants and touch the fluffy posterior of Sugamon, the local duck mascot, for luck. The self-styled 'most exciting bar in Otsuka' almost lives up to the billing with its weekly Tuesday night can-can shows, which see the space transformed into a very Japanese version of a French cabaret Shisui Deux 2-A complete with energetic dancers.



SPRING

Blossom beauty

A ride on the Tokyo Sakura Tram is one of the best ways to appreciate the city's cherry blossoms. Start at Asukayama Park right beside the Asukayama Station: from late March to early April, this hilltop park turns into a sea of pink, complete with night-time illumination. Another superb option is the riverside promenade between Omokagebashi and Waseda stations, as well as Edogawa Park. The latter park is best reached via bus 1 58 (get on at Waseda and disembark at Tsurumakicho).



Railside roses

You'd want to look out the window when riding the Tokyo Sakura Tram (Toden Arakawa line) between early May and early June or between early October and early November This is when about 140 types of roses - a good 13,000 flowers in total - planted by local volunteers burst into bloom along the tracks, adding a stunning splash of colour to the cityscape. The roses between Machiya-Nichome and Minowabashi stations are particularly impressive



13 Fuel up with a purr-fect meal

The owner of this homely café is a cat person, and it shows - even the onigiri are decorated to resemble feline faces. Order the 'Neko musubi gozen', a healthy power meal with miso soup, grilled fish, fried chicken and said purry rice ball. Kuroneko-sha 1-C



15 Indulge in candy for grown-ups

In the candy-making business for more than a century, Muramatsu is a wonderful little snack factory specialising in boozy sweets. Bite into a simple but aromatic whisky bon bon or check out the selection of candy made with both local and imported liquors. Muramatsu Seika 1-C



Pair your buckwheat noodles with crispy tempura, have them in duck broth, or compare textures with the two-type tasting set at one of Sugamo's most notable soba joints. The knowledgeable staff will help you choose – and tempt you with a wide range of sake-compatible appetisers at dinnertime.



This maze of streets next to the railway tracks between Ueno and Okachimachi stations is one of Tokyo's greatest street markets, where you'll find an array of souvenirs and clothes along with countless stalls selling fresh food. Loud, crowded and cheap, it's a fun throwback to the older days.





Enter through the butcher shop - what a brilliant concept for a steakhouse. Nakasei is, above all, a purveyor of the finest quality aged premium kuroge wagyu beef, and you can buy around 20 cuts to take home 都 02 --- Nakasei Uchimise 3-B









Bask in the atmosphere of a bygone era at this solemn temple, revered since the early 1600s as a site of prayers related to children and childbirth. The shops and stalls lining the street in front of the structure are worth a gander too. Kishimojindo 2-A



A fixture on the old-school Joyful Minowa shopping street for over half a century, this local deli offers 80 different dishes daily. Take your pick from yakitori, grilled fish and croquettes, or go straight for the mouth-watering 'menchikatsu' cutlet with softboiled egg Torifuji 2-C


